

# Sunday Morning Adult Bible Class

## 2009-2010

Come and join the Adult Bible class on Sunday mornings from 9:35 am to 10:45 am. Our class is located on the balcony above Parish Hall. Take the elevator to the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor, or the stairs near the Case Library, our class meets in the first office on the balcony.

The following is the schedule of our series. Please check the monthly newsletter and weekly bulletins for changes to this schedule. While each series examines special themes, each class is self-contained and there is no requirement to attend each class in a series. Please come as your schedule permits.

**September 20 thro October 25:** *Encounters with Jesus: Studies in the Gospel of John* by Frances Taylor Gench

Calvin argued that the gospel of John “is a key to open the door for understanding the rest.” Many people love the gospel of John because it is the most christocentric of the gospels, that is, when we read it, Christ seems more up close and personal. We can find ourselves in direct encounter with him. Join the Sunday morning Adult Bible class as they explore the challenges in this gospel and how it informs our faith and lives.

**November 1 through 15:** *The Thoughtful Christian’s Introduction to the Gospel of Mark*

Who was Mark? What is different about his Gospel from the other three? Why does he spend half the book on the death and resurrection of Jesus? How does his message speak to us today? These and other questions will be examined in this three week introduction to the first gospel.

November 1: Identity of Mark. Why, when and to whom he wrote his gospel.

November 8: What does it mean to call Jesus the Son of God?

How did Mark understand this title?

November 15: Mark’s account of the death and resurrection of Jesus.

Why does Mark’s gospel end strangely compared to the other gospels.

**December 6 through 20:** *The Thoughtful Christian’s Advent Through the Eyes of Those who Waited*

This study by Carol Wehrheim introduces and re-introduces participants to several biblical characters found in the lectionary readings for Advent. First, the prophets in the book of Isaiah present us with the idea of waiting and preparing for the Messiah—our work for Advent. Next we meet John the Baptist who announces the coming of the Messiah. Mary, the mother of Jesus, is the main subject of sessions three and four. Protestants, until recently, have not given her much consideration, but we have much to learn about patience and courage from the mother of Jesus. Finally, we learn from Elizabeth about how to accept a blessing so long in coming that it is no longer expected.

## January Hiatus

*This year the Adult Bible committee has decided to take a hiatus in the month of January because of the travels to Israel and to the Gulf Coast. The committee encourages all Adult Bible class members to attend either Case Library Conversations or the Spiritual Life classes.*

### **February 7 through March 21:** *Exodus, Interpretation Bible Studies*

During February and March, join the Adult Bible class as they study Exodus. This Old Testament book is a compelling narrative of three characters: the God of Israel, who rescues a people in captivity after years of silence; Moses, the leader of Israel, who reluctantly accepts his calling and goes on to become the giver of the Law; and the people of Israel, who struggle to be faithful to God after facing near extinction at the hands of its captors. In the weaving of their stories, Exodus becomes a story for our time – a story of seeking and finding a God who redeems us in our moments of separation and sin.

### **April 11 through May 23:** *The Art of Parables: Reinterpreting the Teaching Stories of Jesus in Word & Sculpture*, Charles McCollough

This study of the parables involves both words and images. For each parable, there is a dvd image of sculpture of the artist's interpretation of the parable. Each lesson begins with a question to which the parable speaks. Jesus himself often started a parable with a question, such as "What do you think?" or "Which one of you...?" These questions are tools to engage a class to struggle with issues raised in the parables — which have implications for us today, even though they were asked 2,000 years ago.
